Our Purpose & Mission



Purpose

The purpose of Pride is to provide queer students and allies with safe (physical and virtual) spaces to connect and network, without subjection to judgement, discrimination, and/or criticism. It also allows queer students and allies to access programs, events, and resources that align with Pride's vision and mission statements.



Mission

Pride works to provide a safer space for individuals within and outside of the queer and trans communities, both at the UVic campus and in broader communities. It aims to alleviate all forms of oppression and to address a lack of available safer spaces, community and education regarding queer and trans issues, needs and experiences. Ultimately, it acts as an organization that facilitates community building through various activities and advocates for issues related to sexual orientation and expression and/or gender identity and expression.

The (Re)birth of UVic Pride Collective

On February 2nd 2023, the UVSS, along with queer and trans+ students and allies in UVic, held an Annual General Meeting to formalize the creation of a new queer-centered organization to fill the void left by Pride's predecessor. During that meeting, community members adopted the new name 'Pride Collective', ratified a new constitution, and reinstated the Collective as an official UVSS Constituency Group.

Since then, Pride has conducted regular council meetings, onboarded a new coordinator, renamed and amended its Terms of Reference, and elected Council members.

Moreover, Pride continues to reach its community members through Instagram, which reached 3,255 accounts from April to June 2023. We now have 1,520 students, collective members, and organizations following us for updates on Pride's operations, resources, and programs.

In June 2023, the Pride Collective Council has approved and adopted a new logo that was designed and developed in collaboration with the UVSS Graphics Team.

Projects, Programs and Resources

Despite having only been officially reinstated in February 2023, Pride managed to continue facilitating and running programs, projects and resources through the dedication and efforts of volunteers, community members, and staff.

The following highlights some of the successful initiatives for the year:



Community Circles

volunteer student Led facilitators, 10 different circles routinely got together to provide safe, accessible, and inclusive opportunities to build community. In 2022/2023, there were over 30 community circle gatherings held. This collaborative project with GEM, SOCC, and SSD supports an student identities. of array including the 2SLGBTQIA+, genderdiverse. SEXPO Airbrush Tattoos

In collaboration with GEM, Queer artists, and SEXPO volunteers, Pride Collective coordinated and ran an airbrush tattoo booth at the second annual SEXPO Vendor Fair. Our flash tattoo book had a selection of empowering, flirty, and sexy designs created and submitted by volunteer Queer and Trans artists.

Projects, Programs and Resources



Queer Lending Library

A collection in our lounge of over 600+ novels, books, zines and more that are centered around queer and trans narratives.



Trans Protagonist Pins

A program dedicated to celebrating and supporting the Trans community on campus.



Binder Program

A free gender affirming apparel program that lets community members take or donate a chest binder in our gender neutral washroom.



Tabling and Outreach

Spreading the word about our collective, sharing resources, building connections, and more.

Pride Collective Council and Meetings



The Pride Collective Council is run by students, for students. We are a democratically-run UVSS advocacy group dedicated to serving the 2SLGBTQIA+ community and allies by creating safe spaces for queerness and connection.

The Council is made up of elected UVic student volunteers who work together with staff to provide regular open board meetings, events, programs, services, and resources. Members of the 2SLBGTQIA+ community and allies are welcome to attend and participate in any of these initiatives.

Financial Report

The majority of Pride's funding came from Student Fees, Advocacy Funds, and Constituency Funds, amounting to a total of <u>\$47,273.76</u>. The Collective received approximately <u>0.95</u> cents per full-time undergraduate student for 2022-2023.

Pride also received additional funds from the UVic Bookstore. For every single purchase from their Pride collection, a portion of the profit is donated to the organization.

The Pride Collective Coordinator works with Council members and Board Representative for the preparation of the annual budget. It's then presented to the UVSS Advocacy Relations Committee (ARC) for final approval.

Expenses made for 2022-2023 required at least two signing authorities and supporting documentation for approval.




Fig 1. UVic Pride Collective's expenses for 2022/2023
